
The Song of Solomon

The Song of Solomon, also known as the Song of Songs is a beautiful love poem found in the Hebrew Scriptures (the Old Testament).

It is one of the 'books' of the Bible. You can find it the Old Testament section after the books of Psalms and Proverbs and before the book of Isaiah.

The poem speaks in the voices of two lovers, who praise each other, who long for each other, and who look forward to being together in both physical and spiritual intimacy. They pour out their love and passionate desire and reflect on their feelings for one another.

The poem has also been understood by some readers as a way of imagining how much God loves human beings or how Christ loves his 'bride' the Church.
